WHAT'S HAPPENING IN ST FRANCIS CHURCH?

OPEN CHURCH

It is with great joy that I am able to share the good news that St Francis Church building will be open for individual prayer every Sunday afternoon between the hours of 3pm – 5pm.

Churchwarden Diana Cooper is undertaking leadership of this wonderful development and if you would like to come for prayer or learn more about helping to make this happen every week please either just turn up – or give her a call [01603 434753]

Entry to the church space will be through the Bell Tower doors, where someone will be on duty to meet, greet and explain the procedure.

All will be asked to use the sanitiser that will be made available both at point of entry and exit. And only the chairs closest to the walls of the church will be available for use. This will ensure that as people move through the church the appropriate social distance between devotees is maintained.

Exit will be through the side door close to the altar and the church space will be under the care of a volunteer who will ensure that all the necessary health and safety guidelines are maintained.

If you would like to leave a prayer request on the altar, pens and prayer leaves will be available on request.

Please observe a rule of quiet within the church space to allow others to pray uninterrupted – but feel free to use the Wildflower Field as a meeting point if you would like to pray or chat with friends at the appropriate social distance.

NEW ARRIVALS


Talking of new arrivals the population of the vicarage garden has increased dramatically over the past week.

What happens at PCC?

The St. Francis Parochial Church Council (PCC) met on June 18th for the first time since February. Due to the current restrictions the majority of members took part using Zoom. The PCC is the decision making body of the church and we reflected on what has happened in the last few months and looked forward to the future. Janet [the Incumbent] told us about the amount of food that had been distributed, the families that had been helped and the links that had been formed into the community. She said that the Newsletter had been a particular success in keeping people informed and had generated a lot of positive responses.

Janet also talked about the possibility of a summer holiday project for children run in conjunction with ENYP and about possible changes to the location and format of the Babblers toddler group.

Some of you may have noticed work taking place in and around the Hive. Norwich Diocese will be using part of it for a special project and have been adapting it for that purpose. All the heating and hot water systems are being upgraded and two of rooms at the back will be set aside for this project with the remainder of the building being available for us to use. It also means that the costs of running it will be shared and there are likely to be some spin-off benefits to the community from the actual project.

Deborah reported on the financial situation. This is not particularly good at the moment as our costs are likely to exceed our income this year, so we need to watch our spending carefully. However the costs do allow for the replacement of the flooring in the Church Lounge. The PCC agreed this should go ahead although final decisions have to be taken on the exact flooring that will be chosen. The PCC also agreed that we need to carry out a full electrical check of the building, as it has been over five years since the last check was carried out, and this is required by our insurer.

The last major item of business was a proposal from David and Deborah that the church should set up a Money Advice Centre. This is something we hope will be of real benefit to the community, particularly those who are struggling to pay the bills. We will need to get grants to fund this; we have to set up proper policies and procedures and to get the necessary training, so it is likely to be some months before the centre is ready to open its doors, but we do believe it will be a valuable asset to the community once it is up and running.

THE HIVE

Work continues on the Hive both inside and out.

Inside the new self contained suite of offices for the Diocesan project are taking shape alongside the kitchenette and lavatory facilities that will serve that part of the Hive.

Rather swish new up to minute electric heating units have been installed and adaptations to the hot water system are well under way.

Also, many of you may have noticed that unlike most of us the car park and gardens have had a very professional trim and tidy up. With the trees and shrubs cut back and the overgrown beds thinned out, we can now look with joy upon the Hive knowing that it is being transformed into a new and fit for purpose venue for the mission and ministry of God's church in this community.

We do not as yet have a time frame as to when the improvements will be completed or when the new team colleagues will move in – but watch this space!

ST FRANCIS HEARTSEASE FREE FOOD

We continue to be very blessed in respect of the donations that we are receiving for the ongoing work of St Francis free Food.

This last week has seen a number of wonderful gestures of support – not least a large gift of breakfast cereals and other essentials from Heartsease Primary School.

Many thanks to them for their kindness and support of the Heartsease community.

Well, speaking as a still relatively new vicar here at St Francis I can honestly say that in my short time here there have been some mind boggling changes.

Never did I suspect on 13th November 2019 when I was inducted and collated [an exciting but painless process] that my congregation in church would

suddenly disappear, that almost every church activity would cease and that my only means of communicating with my parishioners would be via phone, email, zoom meetings and the church bell.

Grant this for your only Son Jesus Christ's sake, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.



JEREMIAH 20:7-13



O LORD, you have enticed me, and I was enticed; you have overpowered me, and you have prevailed. I have become a laughing-stock all day long; everyone mocks me.

For whenever I speak, I must cry out,
I must shout, 'Violence and destruction!'

20 Insults have broken my heart, so that I am in despair.


I looked for pity, but there was none; and for comforters, but I found none.



ROMANS 6:1b-11

Should we continue in sin in order that grace may abound? By no means! How can we who died to sin go on living in it? Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life.

For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. For whoever has died is freed from sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.



MATTHEW 10:24-39

'A disciple is not above the teacher, nor a slave above the master; it is enough for the disciple to be like the teacher, and the slave like the master. If they have called the master of the house Beelzebul, how much more will they malign those of his household!

'So have no fear of them; for nothing is covered up that will not be uncovered, and nothing secret that will not become known. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the light; and what you hear whispered, proclaim from the housetops. Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather fear him who can destroy both soul and body in hell. Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground unperceived by your Father. And even the hairs of your head are all counted. So do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows.

'Everyone therefore who acknowledges me before others, I also will acknowledge before my Father in heaven; but whoever denies me before others, I also will deny before my Father in heaven.

'Do not think that I have come to bring peace to the earth; I have not come to bring peace, but a sword. For I have come to set a man against his father, and a daughter against her mother, and a daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law; and one's foes will be members of one's own household.

Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me; and whoever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me; and whoever does not take up the cross and follow me is not worthy of me. Those who find their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it.



REFLECTION FOR 2ND SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

The past few months have seen some of the most difficult times the world and this country has ever seen; at least in modern history.

Frightening, testing times – the kind of times when people look at the church and say things like: 'why do you believe in God, what difference can it make'; and, 'how can there be a God when such terrible things are happening?'

Well, in truth, terrible things have always happened – so the question we must look to is the one that asks where God is in all the terrible things that have happened and continue to happen.

Two thousand years ago when the Gospels were written, people were just beginning to understand who Jesus was and what God was saying to them through Jesus' life, death and resurrection; where God was in all the terrible things that were happening then.

As we read through this week's passage from Matthew and ponder on what Jesus is saying we could not by any means describe his words as consistent in terms of explaining where God might be for us as we struggle through life's ups and downs.

Rather it reads like Matthew has come across a list of Jesus' sayings and simply strung them together.

Some are comforting and inspiring: 'have no fear', 'even the hairs of your head are all counted. But others are, quite frankly, disturbing in their message: 'I have not come to bring peace, but a sword', 'I have come to set a daughter against her mother'.

Not very reassuring or comforting... But, these words of Jesus, contradictory though they are, they speak a truth that needs to be heard and held onto.

These words of Jesus speak into times of turmoil, disaster and life changing trauma.

In times of trouble we want words of comfort, because life, normality and our feelings of security have been broken; life might never be the same again. And Jesus offers this in all that he says.

But his words also remind us that for some, life will be a continual struggle against adversity and injustice, that those who want to bring about all that is Godly and good will often be met with conflict, persecution, and violence.

Jeremiah lived through the siege of Jerusalem, a time of unimaginable slaughter, oppression, suffering and grief.

The prophet's anguish is made all the worse because he cannot proclaim the reassuring message of peace that everyone is longing to hear. Instead he pours out a lament of inner pain and sorrow.

We might think that the reading ends on a positive note of praise, but this is misleading. In the very next verse, Jeremiah curses the day on which he was born.

Then as now, there are no easy answers, no neat resolutions.

Jeremiah's searing words reverberate down the centuries because they chime with the experiences of so many victims of oppression, disaster, disease and famine.

Yet despite his bitter protest, Jeremiah resolutely clings to God.

The Book of Jeremiah and the Gospel of Matthew are texts which were written for the people of their times – communities who were undergoing persecution, distress and loss – but they were books that comforted and held communities together.

Over the past few months we have seen how vital community becomes in times of fear and anguish.

Within days of the lockdown being announced volunteers were mobilising, and offers of help for strangers from strangers were pouring in from people of faith and people of no faith alike

It was concrete, practical help in a time of fear and need. It was also a way of asserting our common humanity. It forged bonds of friendship and commonality.

But if you say you are not my follower, I will tell God in heaven that you don't belong to me. I didn't come to bring peace; I came to bring a sword. Families will turn against each other because of what I say. Anyone who loves their family more than me is not good enough to be my follower. Anyone who is not willing to take up their cross is not good enough to be my follower. If you try to hold onto your life, you will give up true life. But do not fear. If you give up your life for me, you will hold onto true life.'






