### PRAYER MINISTRY IN ST FRANCIS

As from the 1<sup>st</sup> November, All Saints Day, prayer ministry will be available in the lounge area as an integral part of our Sunday morning worship.

Anyone who would like to take advantage of this ministry is invited to make their way to the lounge having received Holy Communion.

The area to the rear of the lounge will be used as the prayer space and those awaiting prayer may sit at one of the socially distanced tables at the church end of the lounge until invited into the prayer area.

Those involved will be using the appropriate PPE and as always confidentiality will be strictly observed. Please remember to wear a face covering if you are able to do so.



As a part of our prayer ministry here at St Francis we are also hoping to form a prayer chain group; this is basically a number of people who agree to pray for individuals or situation upon request – a wonderful source of comfort for those who find themselves in sudden or acute need of prayerful support.

A prayer chain works by having a coordinator who receives the prayer request and then contacts two other members via a phone call – who then in turn contact other members of the prayer chain. This means a number of people can be contacted and asked to pray in a very short space of time.

I have had experience of such chains of prayer and I know that those who have received prayer have found it to be a great source of comfort and strength.

### THE CURATE'S CORNER

As I write, it is Saturday 31<sup>st</sup> October, and tonight is: Hallowe'en. What on earth does that mean? Well, in the church calendar, tomorrow is All Hallowmas, and tonight is the evening (or "e'en" for short) before. Easy peasy!

Seriously, though, what on earth is 'All Hallowmas' about? Well, there's a big clue in the traditional (old) form of the prayer that Jesus taught us, the Lord's prayer. 'Our Father, who art in heaven, <u>hallowed</u> be thy name'. To be 'hallowed' means simply to be made holy, to be set apart from the world and pointed towards God, to be <u>blessed</u>. So the feast of All Hallows is now much more commonly known as the feast of All Saints, the day in the calendar when we honour the 'saints'.

A couple of weeks ago, I wrote about the 'church' as being God's family, a group of people who pray together, and last week I wrote about prayer, too. I've just mentioned the prayer that Jesus taught us, called the 'Lord's Prayer'. You can read about it in the bible, look up Matthew 16:9-13. This is a prayer that Jesus gave us as a kind of a model, which we can use at church services as well as other times when we pray. It covers just about everything we need to pray for.

One thing to remember is that, when we pray, we are never alone. Even when we think we are alone, we are surrounded by a crowd of angels and saints. They also belong to God's family; the same family we become part of when we are baptised. The saints are people who lived before us, people just like us. They are part of the same family of God, the difference being that now they are in heaven, with Jesus. They too are our brothers and sisters. They had to struggle with doubts, fears and misgivings. Some of them had to undergo difficult and painful trials during which they stayed faithful to God and what they believed in about Him. Many of them were very bad people, until they discovered God's love for them and became transformed into the people God wanted them to be. They achieved this through God's grace – a free gift that God will bestow on all of us who believe in Him. They are therefore 'blessed' – or hallowed.

The saints were people who belonged to churches, listened to God's word from the bible, and received the sacrament of holy communion. Through prayer they had a relationship with God their creator, just as we can if we pray. They went before us and they are often described as a great cloud of witnesses, witnesses that testify to the truth of God's love. Some, but by no means all, are remembered in the church's calendar by name. The feast of all saints on November the 1<sup>st</sup> is the one day when we do remember them all, all those who went before us in faith.

So rather than the chaos of darkness and disturbance that has come to characterises the evening before, All Saints is a time of celebration of all things that are alive, and good, and full of healing light. We've tried to reflect that in the church window today by putting up lots of lights and we hope you enjoy them. We want to remind you too, that 'holiness', or being blessed, is not reserved for a few special people who are too good to be true. Holiness is a result of grace, remember the free gift of God. And grace is a gift that is for everyone – and strange though it may seem, the most holy people seem to have been those who are the most broken, the poorest, the people society puts down. All of us can be blessed, should we choose to accept that wonderful gift of grace - the grace that is truly 'amazing!'

In fact, the first saint, I would suggest, and certainly the first disciple of Jesus, was Mary, His mother.



Mary was a plain lowly girl that nobody would have batted an eye at. Yet God chose her to give birth to our Saviour, and the important thing is that she said yes. She is the mother too, of all of us who belong to the family of Jesus.

Here is a prayer to help us to say 'yes' to God:

Father God, help me to be like Mary who always said 'yes' to your love and to your plan for her life.

Very often I say 'no' to your love. I try to push you away. I try to run my own life.

Help me to remember that you made me to be filled with your love and light.

Help me to say 'yes' to you, just as Mary did, so that others may come to know your love through me. Amen

### **REVELATION 7:9 - 17**

### **REFLECTION FOR ALL SAINTS DAY**

On the first Day of November every year the Church celebrates All Saints Day. A day when we honour and give thanks for all the people who have given their lives to God, stood firm in the face of adversity and ultimately either through their life or their death have given us a glimpse of the glory of God

If we were to look them up on the internet we would find that there are over 10,000 named saints – and that's without all the others who aren't named anywhere as saints...

Wait – I hear you say - who are all these others? Well, amazingly enough, anyone who has accepted Jesus Christ as their Lord and Saviour becomes at that moment of acceptance, a saint.

So, if you have Jesus in your heart, and you live by his teaching and you are a part of God's church; you are a saint!

And what is a saint?

Simply someone who belongs to God, someone who lives according to God's way, the way made known to us through Jesus

Some Saints get to be well known – like St Francis, others just quietly live their lives helping others to

live theirs in the best possible way – the way of Jesus.

Today when we commemorate All Saints we not only remember and venerate the Saints of history and tradition – we celebrate and give thanks for the lives of all those who have gone before us in the way of saintliness – people just like us who have lived and loved and done their best to live a godly, Christian life.

And that's all that is asked of us – to do our best for God, to follow Jesus, to listen to his words and live as he would have us live – encouraging others to do the same

True, it will not always be easy, because those who are called to be Saints are not always the most comfortable people to live alongside – but that's what Jesus said didn't he?

He said "Don't be surprised if other people don't think too much of you and persecute you, they won't like the things you have to say, because you are showing them the right way – not the easy way. Just remember that I love you and that the kingdom of heaven is yours, now and for ever"

When Jesus went through his list of people who were especially blessed, he wasn't just talking to those people sitting on the hillside listening to him – he was and is talking to us

In every situation, good or bad, if we follow him and live by his way – we will be blessed and 'all shall be well' to use the words of a certain local saint – Norwich born Mother Julian.

In these dark and uncertain times we are living through, how blessed we are to have such assurance from God, and how blessed we are to have had good examples of Godly living – the saints, people who have walked in faith steadfastly pointing us in the right direction.

So, let us together give thanks for all who have walked in the way of holiness, shared God's love with us, shown us the way and given us a good start in walking the saintly path.

And as we give thanks – let's not forget to look behind us to see who is following us and make sure we are steadfast and faithful in leading them on to saintly living.
