
ASSISTANCE DURING WINTER LOCKDOWN



READINGS FOR THE THIRD SUNDAY OF EPIPHANY GENESIS 14: 17 - 20



After his return from the defeat of Chedorlaomer and the kings who were with him, the king of Sodom went out to meet him at the Valley of

Shaveh (that is, the King's Valley). And King Melchizedek of Salem brought out bread and wine; he was priest of God Most High. He blessed him and said,

'Blessed be Abram by God Most High, maker of heaven and earth; and blessed be God Most High, who has delivered your enemies into your hand!' And Abram gave him one-tenth of everything.

PSALM 128



Blessed are all those who fear the Lord, ◆ and walk in his ways.

You shall eat the fruit of the toil of your hands; ♦ it shall go well with you, and happy shall you be.

Your wife within your house shall be like a fruitful vine; ◆ your children round your table, like fresh olive branches.

Thus shall the one be blest ♦ who fears the Lord.

REVELATION 19: 6 – 10

Then I heard what seemed to be the voice of a great multitude, like the sound of many waters and like the sound of mighty thunder-peals, crying out,

'Hallelujah!
For the Lord our God
the Almighty reigns.
Let us rejoice and exult
and give him the glory,
for the marriage of the Lamb has come,
and his bride has made herself ready;

to her it has been granted to be clothed with fine linen, bright and pure' for the fine linen is the righteous deeds of the saints.



And the angel said to me, 'Write this: Blessed are those who are invited to the marriage supper of the Lamb.' And he said to me, 'These are true words of God.' Then I fell down at his feet to worship him, but he said to me, 'You must not do that! I am a fellow-servant with you and your comrades who hold the testimony of Jesus. Worship God! For the testimony of Jesus is the spirit of prophecy.'

JOHN 2: 1 - 11



the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' And Jesus said to her, 'Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' Now standing there were six stone water-jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, 'Fill the jars with water.' And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, 'Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward.' So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, 'Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now.' Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

REFLECTION FOR THE THIRD SUNDAY OF EPIPHANY

What comes to mind when we say 'Family'?

I expect that all sorts of positive and negative words come to mind. Worried? Grateful? Happy? Distressed? We know that there are grieving families who, tragically, have lost loved ones recently, and we have seen this in our own church family.

Even if this is not your present experience, the scenario of large families cooped up together, home schooling, separation and isolation, and other difficulties you can think of, means that family life in this pandemic is under pressure. So -when we read Psalm 128, with its image of idyllic family life coming to those who trust in God, I expect for some of us the response will be, "Yeah, right: that's not our experience."

But hold on and we will come back to this Psalm. For the moment remember this: God has families in his heart. If you want to reinforce this, remember the image in our last reading from Revelation, where life in heaven is pictured as a marriage between Jesus and the church.(19:7) I know this is a tricky idea, but it does tell us again: family is at the heart of the way God thinks about people.

Family features in the first miracle in John's gospel, at a wedding. Strangely, we don't hear about the happy couple. What we do hear is a conversation between Jesus and his mother, and then a miracle performed by who? The servants! Sure, his mother alerts Jesus to the impending disaster – no more wine – and Jesus tells them what to do, but it's the servants who do it!

What did they do? They filled the six stone water jars with water. How long did that take? Well, apparently these jars held about 100 litres, so the servants had to get 600 litres from the well to the jars. How long it took depends on the size of their jugs and the number of servants, and how empty these jars were to start with, but long enough for the servants to be asking each other, 'What's all this about? We've run out of wine and we're filling up the washing jars ...'

They are also the ones, at the sharp end: they know that this is water, but they have to take it to the head steward as wine. What reception did they expect from the boss? What were they feeling? And what did they think when they heard the boss say, 'Wow! This wine is amazing!' (or words to that effect.) Then, when they got home, what did they

tell their families? 'You'll never guess what happened today...'

So in this season of Epiphany, when we have travelled with the magi to see God revealed in the infant Jesus, and been to the Jordan to see Jesus revealed in his baptism, we take another journey. We travel to out of the way, peasant, Galilee, to a little village, Cana, to see God revealed to who? The servants! Well, yes, Jesus and his mother were involved, but it was put in the hands of the least of the least, the servants. Everyone else would have found out about it at some point but these were the guys whose adrenalin would have been pumping because they actually did it! Wow! It was like Jesus opened the family to them.

So for us, if we feel a bit on the outside, a bit like the servants, let us remember that God has a place for us in his family.

On the other hand, if we are fortunate enough to be secure in a reasonably functioning family, do what Jesus did, and include others. I've seen people who love their families, but it seems like their family is all that matters. Now, of course our families matter, we've just said so, but...

In another story, when Jesus was told his family wanted to see him, he said that his family were those who did what God wanted (Mark 3:35) In this story, when Jesus tells his mother that 'My hour has not yet come' (v 4) he may be saying that doing what God wants comes before doing what your mother says. The picture of family bliss in Psalm 128 comes to those who 'Fear the Lord' and are concerned about the wellbeing of the whole community.(Psalm 128: 4-5) So in our families we have to listen to God, and one thing he says loud and clear is this: try and include others. By the way, I reckon 600 litres makes about 3600 glasses of wine. That's a lot, so needed sharing don't you think?

So for us? Let us love our families, of course, but at the same time let us hold the door wide open (yes I know we can't do that physically...). At the moment that is difficult. A phone call?

One of the loveliest experiences I had on coming to St Francis was sitting in the lounge on a Messy Church morning, eating breakfast, having fun and worshipping together as a big church family. In this Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, the whole church can be united in this, the need, eventually, to find new ways of expressing family life together.

I can offer you the story of Alison Phipps, who brought up in Sheffield, now has an Eritrean granddaughter who calls her 'Abay!' ('Grandmother'

in Tigrinya, an Eritrean language.) This is because over many years she opened her home to refugees, inviting them to be part of her family.

Finally, I said we'd go back to Psalm 128. What I get from this is that God sees the family unit, whatever shape that takes, as a real focus.. Of course, time and place changes what we mean by a family unit. In the Old Testament marriage was assumed, but in the New we see the single lives of both Paul and Jesus. At my son's wedding in Mexico his wife's grandmother was surrounded by a huge clan for a family photo.

But whatever family looks like, we are talking about a small unit of love and care, of love and laughter and arguments, and yes, tragedy and pain, shared. It's into this that we need to allow people, to keep our family door not exclusive, but open.

In closing, what is FAMILY?

Can I suggest

F is for friendship
A is for all
M is for many
I is for in, come in, come through the door
L is for laughter, and also Lament
Y is for Yes!!! Of course you can come in!

Two days later there was a wedding in the town of Cana in Galilee. Jesus' mother was there. Jesus and his followers were also invited to the wedding. When all the wine was gone, Jesus' mother said to him, "They have no more wine."

Jesus answered, "Dear woman, why come to me? My time has not yet come."

His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you to do."


In that place there were six stone water jars. The Jews used jars like these in their washing ceremony. Each jar held about 20 or 30 gallons.


Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the jars with water." So they filled the jars to the top.

Then he said to them, "Now take some out and give it to the master of the feast."

So the servants took the water to the master. When he tasted it, the water had become wine. He did not know where the wine came from. But the servants who brought the water knew. The master of the wedding called the bridegroom and said to him, "People always serve the best wine first. Later, after the guests have been drinking a lot, they serve the cheaper wine. But you have saved the best wine till now."

So in Cana of Galilee, Jesus did his first miracle. There he showed his glory, and his followers believed in him.





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
