WHAT'S HAPPENING IN ST FRANCIS CHURCH?

75TH ANNIVERSARY OF VE DAY

From the moment I stepped out of the door to open up the church for the first St Francis Heartsease Free Food delivery of the day it was clear that it was going to be a beautiful day!

ST FRANCIS HEARTSEASE FREE FOOD

The Free Food volunteers remain as busy as ever with hundreds of kilos of food being given out on the Free Food table or parcelled out and delivered onto local doorsteps every week.

This week I though it would be nice to feature our delivering duo Jim and Sue Green who week by week have carefully transported dozens and dozens of parcels around the Heartsease using only pedal power.



Thank you to them and and a special thank you also to Eleanor [picture next week!] who plays a huge part in making not only the Free Food initiative happen, both in packing parcels and delivering [she too relies mostly on pedal power] but also coordinates much of St Francis pastoral response with innumerable phone calls and emails. PASTORAL CARE

As I mentioned last week a big part of church life is ensuring that every single person connected with the church feels that not only are they a part of the church family – but that they are seen and listened to. Spiritual wellbeing is paramount, but physical and emotional well being is important too.

Everyone is of equal importance, and where someone's well being is vulnerable it is the responsibility of the church to try and assist in any way possible. That includes taking up issues on behalf of individuals or groups who might be struggling in terms of having their voices heard by organisations or institutions.



It was recently brought to our attention that some families on the estate were struggling to access the School Meal Repacement Voucher Scheme introduced by the government to help families cope with providing additional meals for their children whilst schools are closed.

After identifying the issue Eleanor contacted Adam Giles [City Councillor for Crome Ward] who very swiftly took the matter up and was able to give us the good news that any family experiencing difficulty accessing the vouchers can contact the relevant school direct and that the school is then required to do all they can to resolve the issue, providing printed vouchers if necessary.

If you or anyone you know is still experiencing problems relating to these vouchers please get in touch and we will take it further.

In terms of providing the best possible pastoral care for St Francis parishioners we are endebted to both Councillor Adam Giles and Councillor Alan Waters for their support and assistance at this very difficult time.

It has been a very interesting experience to pray a lot in the Bell Tower before and after ringing the bell – but one that I can now put behind me as I stand in our beautiful church space or sit in the Chancel and offer up prayer throughout the day. Alleluia! Rest assured I will be praying for the day to come swiftly when when we can all be there together again.



A WORD FROM THE VICAR

Friday 8th May is not only the anniversary of VE day, it is also the day when the church commemorates the life of a very important Norwich woman.

Mother Julian was the first woman to ever write a book in the English language and she is also now regarded as one of the most influential female spiritual writers of all time.

Her book 'Revelations of Divine Love' written in the late fourteenth century carefully documents a series of visions she experienced when seriously ill and tells us what God revealed to her through those visions.

It took her many, many years of prayer and self denial to reach the point where she was able write the book – but in the course of her struggles she became a great source of inspiration and spiritual support to the many people of her day who went to her window to seek advice. They could not go to her door, simply because she didn't have one.

As an anchorite, someone who chose to live a solitary religious life, she was walled up in a small cell which was attached to her parish church.

So, no doorway, just three windows. One to look into the church sanctuary to observe and take part in the daily Holy Communion that took place there; one where her food was passed through and the third which was open to the world – the one where people could call through the curtain to seek her help. And seek her out they did, because Mother Julian spoke of wonderful things – like God's love for us; his tender care for all that he has made; his promise of hope. Life changing knowledge for them – and life transforming for us as well.

Mother Julian's book is a beautiful expression of her love for God, her dependence upon the grace of God received through Jesus and the hope and promise she received from him.

Julian knew what it was to suffer; she had lived through times of plague and social unrest, she knew what it was to be alone – she knew what it was like to struggle.

And yet her faith, her prayerful way of being and her utter reliance upon God enabled her to live a solitary life of prayer and to pass on the greatest of all gifts – the gift of God given hope.

'All shall be well, and all manner of thing shall be well'. Those few words of promise, revealed by God to Mother Julian of Norwich is perhaps one of the most quoted phrases in the English Language – how wonderful it is that it was a Norwich girl who spoke them, and how much more wonderfully they have travelled down through the centuries to us.

And they are, of course, especially relevant for us as we find our way through these times of worrying disease, social uncertainty, and personal isolation.

All shall be well – and indeed they shall.

Like Mother Julian we may be living in an unfamiliar way, quite possibly, like her, completely isolated – cut off from those around us; but we are not alone. God is with us, and God's promise is as alive and relevant now as it was when Mother Julian first heard them breathed by the Spirit into her soul.

All shall be well.

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK

In Mother Julian's time the water supply from wells and other sources was so risky that people drank brewed small ale rather than risk illness and possibly even death by drinking the local Norwich water.

Times have changed in Norwich – but in other parts of the world nothing much has changed at all.



For many, not only is gaining access to water hard, dangerous work – all too often the only water available is contaminated with life threatening pollution. Thankfully, among their many other projects, Christian Aid is working hard to bring fresh, clean water supplies where they are need the most.

Sunday 10th May is the first day of Christian Aid week and a good day to think about how we here at St Francis can support the fundraising effort. How about 10p in a pot every time we flush the lavatory; fill the kettle; wash our hands – get ourselves a glass of water? I think we might be surprised at how quickly the funds would add up...

READINGS FROM SCRIPTURE FOR THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

GENESIS 8: 1 - 19

But God remembered Noah and all the wild animals and all the domestic animals that were with him in the ark. And God made a wind blow over the earth, and the waters subsided; the fountains of the deep and the windows of the heavens were closed, the rain from the heavens was restrained, and the waters gradually receded from the earth. At the end of one hundred and fifty days the waters had abated; and in the seventh month, on the seventeenth day of the month, the ark came to rest on the mountains of Ararat. The waters continued to abate until the tenth month; in the tenth month, on the first day of the month, the tops of the mountains appeared.

At the end of forty days Noah opened the window of the ark that he had made and sent out the raven; and it went to and fro until the waters were dried up from the earth.



Then he sent out the dove from him, to see if the waters had subsided from the face of the ground; but the dove found no place to set its foot, and it returned to him to the ark, for the waters were still on the face of the whole earth. So he put out his hand and took it and brought it into the ark with him. He waited another seven days, and again he sent out the dove from the ark; and the dove came back to him in the evening, and there in its beak was a freshly plucked olive leaf; so Noah knew that the waters had subsided from the earth. Then he waited another seven days, and sent out the dove; and it did not return to him any more.

In the six hundred and first year, in the first month, on the first day of the month, the waters were dried up from the earth; and Noah removed the covering of the ark, and looked, and saw that the face of the ground was drying. In the second month, on the twenty-seventh day of the month, the earth was dry. Then God said to Noah, 'Go out of the ark, you and your wife, and your sons and your sons' wives with you. Bring out with you every living thing that is with you of all flesh — birds and animals and every creeping thing that creeps on the earth — so that they may abound on the earth, and be fruitful and multiply on the earth.'



So Noah went out with his sons and his wife and his sons' wives. And every animal, every creeping thing, and every bird, everything that moves on the earth, went out of the ark by families.

ACTS 7:55-end

But filled with the Holy Spirit, Stephen gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of God.

'Look,' he said, 'I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God!'

But they covered their ears, and with a loud shout all rushed together against him.

Then they dragged him out of the city and began to stone him; and the witnesses laid their coats at the feet of a young man named Saul.

While they were stoning Stephen, he prayed, 'Lord Jesus, receive my spirit.'

Then he knelt down and cried out in a loud voice, 'Lord, do not hold this sin against them.'

When he had said this, he died.

1 PETER 2:2-10

Like newborn infants, long for the pure, spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow into salvation — if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is good.

Come to him, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For it stands in scripture:

'See, I am laying in Zion a stone, a cornerstone chosen and precious; and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame.'

To you then who believe, he is precious; but for those who do not believe,

'The stone that the builders rejected has become the very head of the corner',

and

'A stone that makes them stumble, and a rock that makes them fall.'



They stumble because they disobey the word, as they were destined to do.

But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvellous light.

Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.



JOHN 14:1-14

'Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house there are many dwelling-places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also. And you know the way to the place where I am going.' Thomas said to him, 'Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?' Jesus said to him, 'I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. If you know me, you will know my Father also. From now on you do know him and have seen him.'



Philip said to him, 'Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied.' Jesus said to him, 'Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, "Show us the Father"? Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words that I say to you I do not speak on my own; but the Father who dwells in me does his works. Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; but if you do not, then believe me because of the works themselves. Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it.

REFLECTION FOR THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

This week our Gospel reading takes us back to the last supper and the point where Jesus has told the disciples he will be leaving them. They are understandably dismayed at the prospect and Jesus' words are words of reassurance, "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me."

He goes on to say that there is plenty of space in his Father's house and he is going to prepare a place for them. When Thomas asks "how do we get there?", Jesus responds "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life". Like many of Jesus' sayings this needs some further explanation to help us know what he means.

<u>I am the Way</u>. If you've ever been to a strange place and had to ask directions it is slightly helpful to be told "turn left at the pub, right at the cricket field and right again past the railway bridge. Much more helpful is someone who says "Come with me and I'll show you".

When Jesus says "I am the Way" it is this second type of help he is offering. He himself has gone through life before us, experiencing all its ups and downs. More than that he has suffered unimaginable pain on our behalf and by doing so has created the way for us to be reconciled to God. He doesn't just point out the path, he takes us by the hand, leads us along it and walks with us all the way.

<u>I am the Truth</u>. In this world of fake news and seemingly endless false claims, this is a very important statement. We all know how much of a difference it makes when we find someone we can really trust, whether friend, relative or even a good plumber who will always get the job done.

In his life, work and teaching Jesus demonstrated complete integrity and trustworthiness. He was always prepared to speak the truth even when it was unpopular. He also lived a life entirely consistent with what he said. More than that, he revealed to us the truth about God. He can say to Philip "Whoever has seen me has seen the Father" (meaning God).

<u>I am the Life</u>. Elsewhere in John's Gospel Jesus says "I have come that you may have life in all its fullness". By his death on the Cross Jesus has dealt with the sin which separated humans from God and has opened the way to life. The promise is life eternal with him. This means the life we are currently living is given a new dimension when we live it with him and we are promised eternal life in his presence after we die.


Jesus goes on to say "No-one comes to the Father except through me." Christianity is the only faith that tells the story of a God who loved us so much that he came down to share our human life and to die to renew our relationship with him.

Finally we have the promise "Whatever you ask in my name, I will do it." This doesn't mean that adding "in Jesus name" to every prayer request means that we will get what we ask for. It means that as our relationship with Jesus deepens and matures we should be able to listen for his voice guiding our thoughts and prayers so that what we ask for is in accordance with his will rather than in line with our own wishes.


This is particularly difficult at this present time when prayers for Covid-19 to disappear do not seem to be being answered, or at least not as quickly and easily as any of us would wish. I don't really have a good answer for this except that my experience is that God is trustworthy and will answer prayers in a way that is best for us even though it may not look like that at the time. That is one thing that the various prayer stations we have prepared are there to reflect and help with. The Psalms chosen show a wide variety of feelings and moods but they all reflect on the trustworthiness of God, and we are encouraged to pray persistently and faithfully even when there is no immediate sign of an answer.

So I think that Jesus words at the start of this reading are well worth taking to heart. In these troubled times he says to us "Let not your hearts be troubled, Believe in God, believe also in me. He is the one who will guide us and walk beside us on life's journey. He is the one who we can trust absolutely. He is the one who offers us life in all its fullness. He is the one who demonstrates how much God loves us and he us the one who promises to hear and answer when we pray. So when we do feel troubled let's turn to him for comfort, help and support.
